The University of Michigan Law School has developed a semester study abroad opportunity with the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven for up to two students per academic year. Students may go in either the fall or winter term. Interested students must comply with the General Guidelines for Semester Legal Studies Abroad available in the Center for International and Comparative Law, 300D Legal Research and on the Law School web site at: <http://www.law.umich.edu/curriculum/studyabroad/Pages/default.aspx>. Please consult the General Guidelines along with this document. They contain important additional information, including how to apply.

Course Offerings and Requirements

Students who attend the Katholieke University Leuven will primarily take courses in the ERASMUS program. Classes are conducted in English. In addition, students will be required to write a 3-credit research paper under the supervision of a Michigan Law School faculty member. In addition to the course requirements at the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, students will be responsible for fulfilling all the requirements for the transfer of credit described in the General Guidelines for Semester Legal Studies Abroad (available at the Center for International and Comparative Law).

A student's course selection at Katholieke Universiteit Leuven must be approved by the University of Michigan Law School prior to the student's departure for Leuven. Any subsequent requested changes must be approved in advance by Assistant Dean Virginia Gordan (vgordan@umich.edu; TEL: 734-764-5269). The acceptance of any credit or grade for any course taken at Katholieke Universiteit Leuven is subject to determination by the University of Michigan Law School.

Leuven will not consider students whose cumulative GPA is less than 3.0 (B)

Tuition

Katholieke University Leuven does not charge tuition to Michigan students who participate in this exchange program. Students must pay full tuition and fees to the University of Michigan Law School as described in the General Guidelines for Semester Legal Studies Abroad. Please note that the tuition structure and amount are subject to change at any time.

Dates of Term

Orientation days are September 16-20, 2009: <http://www.kuleuven.be/orientationdays/> for the first semester (our fall term). Fall term classes begin September 22, 2009, and end December 19, 2009. The study period runs from January 4, 2010, through January 10, 2010, and the exam period runs from January 11, 2010 – January 30, 2010. However, the exam period may be adapted for students who need to return home before Christmas, as follows: Students will take oral exams during the last week of classes, which for fall 2009, would be the week of December 14, 2009. Written exams will take place back at the University of Michigan Law School on the same date as scheduled in Leuven, and will be organized, in coordination with Leuven, by Ms. Debby Hartranft, University of Michigan Law School Student Services Exam and Grade Coordinator (dmhart@umich.edu; tel: 647-7589).

Orientation days are February 3-7, 2010. <http://www.kuleuven.be/orientationdays/> for the second semester (our winter term). Check back at this site for the orientation schedule. Winter term classes begin February 8, 2010, and end May 22, 2010. The study period runs from May 23, 2010 through June 6, 2010, and the exam period runs from June 7, 2010 – July 3, 2010. **Please know that Leuven is unable to meet any individual requests in allowing students to take exams prior to the scheduled spring (our winter term) exam period (June 7, 2010 – July 3, 2010).**

Leuven Application

Students who receive approval from the Law School's Graduate Programs and Foreign Affiliations Committee to study abroad at Leuven will then be required to promptly complete a Leuven application form.

In addition to the Leuven application form, the student's official academic transcripts (law school and undergraduate), statement of purpose (this may be the same as that submitted to the Graduate Programs and Foreign Affiliations Committee), and a letter of recommendation from a law professor may be required.
