Federica Coppola is a Ph.D. researcher in Law at the European University Institute in Florence (Italy), and she works on Criminal Law and Neuroscience with Prof. Dennis M. Patterson and Prof. Judge Amedeo Santosuosso. Her doctoral dissertation investigates how neuroscientific teachings about decision-making processes in moral judgements might change specific assumptions about human thought and behavior underlying *mens rea* and insanity doctrines, and ultimately aims at proposing a neuroscientifically informed theory of culpability. Her research interests include comparative criminal law, criminal procedure, theory of punishment, law and neuroscience, law and (neuro)criminology, law and psychology.

Federica was awarded a Law Degree (equivalent of J.D.), *summa cum laude*, from University of Bologna Law School in 2010. Prior to joining academia, she practiced criminal law for two years. She is admitted to the Italian Bar Association as Qualified Lawyer ('Avvocato'). She specializes in legal psychology, and she holds an LL.M degree in Comparative, European, and International Laws from the European University Institute. Since 2012, Federica is also a fellow at the European Center for Law, Science, and New Technologies, University of Pavia (Italy). Since 2013, she lectures on criminal law, and criminal case law at the Law and Neuroscience Winter School promoted by the European Association for Neuroscience and Law (EANL). Currently, she is a Visiting Research Scholar at the University of Pennsylvania Law School, and she works with Prof. Stephen J. Morse.
