Elad is a S.J.D candidate at Duke University School of Law. His research project, titled “Judicial Review in the Age of Forever Wars: the developing role of courts in liberal democracies in states of national emergency, examines the evolution of judicial involvement in emergency governance in light of the changing nature of contemporary states of emergency.

Elad earned his LL.b. in Law from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (2010) and his LL.m in International law as a Fulbright scholar from American University School of Law, where was awarded the Ed Bou Award and the Solf Award for excellence in international legal studies (2012). He is the author of *A Reexamination of Administrative Detention in a Jewish and Democratic State*, published in 2011 (Israel Democracy Institute Press) and *Judicial Answer to Political Question: The Political Question Doctrine in the United States and Israel*, published in 2014 (Boston University Pub. Int. L.J.).

Before joining Duke, Elad was a research assistant and a researcher at the Israel Democracy Institute (IDI). In 2010 he participated in the International Task Force on Terrorism, Democracy, and the Law, a joint research project by the IDI, the Woodrow Wilson Center and the Max Planck Institute for Foreign and International Criminal Law. Elad was also a research fellow at the Institute for Counter-Terrorism (2012-14) and an associate with Gross, Kleinhendler, Hodak, Halevy, Greenberg and Co. in Tel-Aviv (2012-2014).
