

Olga Frishman – Bio

Olga is currently a Golda Meir/Lady Davis Postdoctoral Fellow at the Faculty of Law, Hebrew University of Jerusalem and an Adjunct Professor at Tel Aviv University.

She did her Ph.D. at the direct program towards a Ph.D. in law at the Zvi Meitar Center for Advanced Legal Studies at Tel-Aviv University. Her dissertation, titled “Courts and their Audiences: Organizational Identity, Organizational Images, Intended Images, and Institutional Isomorphism of Courts” was written under the supervision of Professor Eyal Benvenisti. The dissertation used concepts from organizational theory to examine courts’ relationships with their audiences as well as the way globalization is likely to influence these relationships.

Before her doctoral studies, she received her LL.B (summa cum laude) in the field of law and her B.A. (magna cum laude) in the field of management from the Tel-Aviv University. Olga also clerked for the Supreme Court Chief Justice Asher Grunis.

During her doctoral studies Olga was a visiting researcher at the Institute of Global Law and Policy (IGLP) at Harvard Law School and a member of the ERC GlobalTrust project.

Olga’s academic interests include: constitutional law and constitutional theory, comparative constitutional law, political theory, international law, judicial behavior, jurisprudence, and organizational theory.
