Alan Z. Rozenshtein joined the University of Minnesota Law School as a visiting professor in 2017 and will continue as an Associate Professor of Law starting in summer 2019. He is also an affiliate with the Berkman Klein Center for Internet and Society at Harvard University and a member of the Scholars Strategy Network.

From October 2014 to April 2017, he served as an attorney advisor in the Office of Law and Policy in the National Security Division of the U.S. Department of Justice, where his work focused on operational, legal, and policy issues relating to cybersecurity and foreign intelligence. From October 2016 to April 2017, he served as a special assistant United States attorney for the District of Maryland. During this time he taught cybersecurity at Georgetown Law. Before joining the Justice Department, Professor Rozenshtein clerked for Judge J. Harvie Wilkinson III of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 4th Circuit. He is a graduate of Harvard Law School.
