

**Anne Gladitz** is a Fulbright Visiting Scholar at UC Berkeley pursuing her research under the guidance of Professor Claire Kramsch in the field of Applied Linguistics. Her PhD project is about the importance of cultural background knowledge in German foreign language teaching for legal purposes. She conducted her PhD fieldwork with a DAAD scholarship at the law schools of the Istanbul University (Turkey), Andr ssy University Budapest (Hungary), and the University of Exeter (UK).

At the University of Bielefeld (Germany) she holds a position as research assistant in the department of German as a foreign language. Until her leave she coordinated the Masters program in German studies and German as a foreign language and served as an elected member of the university's finance commission. Since 2013 she has also been an associate at the Law and Society Institute at the Humboldt-Universit t zu Berlin (Germany).

Anne studied "German as a Foreign Language", "Art History", and "Law" at the Technische Universit t Dresden (Germany) and the P zm ny P ter Catholic University in Budapest (Hungary).

After her graduation in 2005, she moved to Istanbul (Turkey), where she worked for six years at the Marmara University as a lecturer for the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD). She taught in Departments of Law and Translation Studies courses on German law and legal language. Since 2006, she has also taught German and conducted teacher trainings for the Goethe-Institut in Turkey and Germany.

Anne has given lectures and workshops in the field of language education and cultural studies at universities and international conferences in Germany, Turkey, Bulgaria, Hungary, Greece, and Italy.

She is also directing "devised theatre" projects with young people dealing with recognition and daily social life issues. Most recently, she is involved in a production adapting the script of 12 angry men.
