

Tamar Meshel is an SJD candidate at the University of Toronto Faculty of Law, under the supervision of Prof. Karen Knop and Prof. Jutta Brunnee. Her dissertation explores the different ways in which international law can contribute to the effective and peaceful resolution of transboundary freshwater disputes, including the development of international water law principles and regional or international institutions and agreements, and an empirical analysis of states' use of different dispute resolution mechanisms in this context. Tamar has also researched and published in the areas of international commercial arbitration, investor-State arbitration, international environmental law, and interstate territorial disputes.

Tamar holds a BA (Hons) and LLM degrees from the University of Toronto and a JD degree from the University of British Columbia, Canada, and is a member of the Law Societies of British Columbia and Upper Canada. Prior to commencing her graduate studies, Tamar articulated and worked as an associate in the international dispute resolution group of an international law firm in Vancouver, as Deputy Counsel at the International Court of Arbitration in Paris, and as a legal advisor to the Jerusalem Arbitration Center in Israel and Palestine. She was also a Graduate Fellow at The Carter Center in Atlanta, and will be joining the Max Planck Institute in Luxembourg as a Research Fellow in 2015.
