Exonerees in 2018 Lost a Record Number of Years to Wrongful Imprisonment

- 2018 Exonerees spent 1,639 years in prison for crimes they did not commit - that's 10.9 years on average per exoneree
- Two of the [longest-serving defendants](#) in the Registry were exonerated in 2018: [Richard Phillips](#), who served 45 years and two months for murder in Michigan, and [Wilbert Jones](#), who served 44 years and nine months for sexual assault in Louisiana
- 2018 also saw a record number of exonerations that occurred in part because some official misconduct was committed. Of 151 exonerations, at least [107](#) included official misconduct by police, prosecutors, or other government officials. [Fifty-four homicides](#) – 79 percent of homicide exonerations in 2018 – involved official misconduct.
- Since the 2017 Report, we have learned of 11 new Conviction Integrity Units - most of which were formed in 2018.

The two longest-serving defendants in the Registry were exonerated in 2018.




Richard Phillips served **45 years and 2 months** for murder in Michigan.




Wilbert Jones served **44 years and 9 months** for sexual assault in Louisiana.

*Indicates a record number


CONVICTION INTEGRITY UNITS

There were 44 Conviction Integrity Units (CIUs) in the United States in 2018, more than three times the number in 2013. CIUs were involved in **58** exonerations in 2018.

Innocence Organizations (IOs) and CIUs worked together on a record **45*** exonerations in 2018.
