Andreas is assistant professor at the Institute of European and International Law of the WU Vienna University of Economics and Business in Vienna, Austria (since 2012). He currently prepares his second-book thesis ("Habilitation") on informal constitutional change and constitutional workarounds in the European Union and the United States.

He studied law at the University of Vienna School of Law (Mag. iur.) and as a Fulbright and Arthur T. Vanderbilt Scholar at New York University School of Law (LL.M.). Also, he earned a B.A. degree and diplôme in political science from the University of Vienna and Sciences Po Paris, respectively. He wrote his award-winning doctoral thesis (Dr. iur.) on prospects of and limits to establishing EU agencies (published by Mohr Siebeck ed.) under the supervision of Stefan Griller and Karl Korinek.

From 2005 onwards he worked as a research fellow and lecturer at the Research Institute for European Affairs of the WU Vienna University of Economics and Business. For three years, he practiced constitutional and regulatory law at Schoenherr Rechtsanwaelte in Vienna. His research focuses on constitutional law in its European, Austrian and comparative perspectives, issues of the European composite administration (in particular EU Banking Union) as well as Austrian administrative and regulatory law.
