Yahli Shereshevsky is a Ph.D. candidate in the Faculty of Law at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. His dissertation, which examines the challenges posed to the pragmatic compromise ethos of International Humanitarian Law by contemporary asymmetrical conflicts, is being written under the supervision of Prof. Yuval Shany. Yahli is enrolled in the Hoffman Leadership and Responsibility Fellowship Program and has received the Hebrew University President's Scholarship for Outstanding Doctoral Students.
