

INMATE GRIEVANCE PROGRAM ANNUAL REPORT - 2005

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I. INTRODUCTION

The Inmate Grievance Program (IGP) functions under Departmental Directive #4040 entitled "Inmate Grievance Program" and Departmental Directive #4041 entitled "Inmate Grievance Program Modification Plan" and is established by the statutory mandates of Section 139 NYS Correction Law and N.Y.C.R.R., Title 7, Part 701.

The Inmate Grievance Program provides each inmate an orderly, fair, simple and expeditious method of resolving grievances pursuant to Section 139, NYS Correction Law. This grievance program includes procedures for inmates to resolve allegations of discriminatory treatment in accordance with the State Commission of Correction regulation 9 NYCRR Part 7695. Grievances filed prior to July 7, 1990 were reviewed by the NYS Commission of Correction and responded to by the Commissioner. Correction Law 139 was amended by Chapter 373 of the Laws of 1990 deleting the requirement that the Commission of Correction review individual grievances, yet required the Commission of Correction to review and assess the grievance process on an annual basis. The elimination of the advisory step ensures that the grievance process is more expeditious while at the same time allows the Commission of Correction to provide oversight.

On September 28, 1992, the U. S. Department of Justice, Office of the Associate Attorney General, pursuant to the authority conferred by Title 42, United States Code, Section 1997e and Part 40 of Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations granted full certification that the NYS Department of Correctional Services Inmate Grievance Program is in substantial compliance with the standards set forth in Part 40 of Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations. Based on this certification, the court may order that prior to litigating claims under 42 U.S.C. Section 1983, New York State inmates shall exhaust any remedies they have with respect to the claim through the Inmate Grievance Program. For the purpose of this order, the disposition of the Central Office Review Committee (CORC) constitutes sufficient proof of exhaustion. In 1996, the federal government passed the Prisoner's Litigation Reform Act (PLRA) which enacted the same requirement for all inmates.

On May 29, 2001, the United States Supreme Court decision in <u>Booth v. Churner</u> required that prisoners exhaust their administrative remedies before bringing damage lawsuits in federal court even if the administrative remedy does not provide damages. Subsequently, on February 26, 2002, the United States Supreme Court decision in <u>Porter v. Nussle</u> held that the exhaustion requirement applies to all inmate suits about prison life, whether they involve general circumstances or particular episodes and whether they allege excessive force or some other wrong. These decisions, along with the PLRA have had an impact on the number of grievances being appealed to CORC. The impact is addressed in Part IV of this report.

II. STATISTICAL ANALYSIS OF IGP WORKLOAD

The number of grievances filed in 2005 was 45,345, an increase from the 44,587 filed in 2004. This is an increase of 758 grievances as compared to the decrease of 639 grievances realized last year. However, the trend in the last six years is one of fluctuating from an increase to a decrease each year and vice-versa with a high in 1999 of 45,797 grievances and a low of 41,281 in 2000. The non-calendared inmate contacts continued the decreasing trend with 37,999 in 1999 to the 25,625 in 2005. The trend by inmates to file a grievance so that the administrative remedies can be exhausted has continued. Thus, the inmates who do file grievances are tending to exhaust the administrative remedy with an appeal to CORC.

This 2005 total of 45,345 represents an increase of 1.42%, while the inmate population decreased by 4.1% from the 66,056 average in 2004 to an average of 63,360 in 2005 (refer to graphs #1 and #2). In 2005, there were 715.7 grievance submissions per one thousand inmates, which is 3.6% more than the 689.45 grievance submissions per one thousand inmates in 2004.

During 2005, IGP field staff recorded approximately 25,625 non-calendared inmate contacts which clarified issues and/or enabled inmates to resolve problems without the submission of calendared grievances. Non-calendared contacts in 2005 reflect a decrease of 2,086 from the 27,711 non-calendared contacts logged in 2004.


In 2005, there were 5,324 grievances (11.7% of the total filed) informally resolved by the Inmate Grievance Resolution Committee (IGRC). The number of informal resolutions realized by the IGRC in 2005 is more than the 4,954 grievances (11.11% of the total filed) in 2004. This is an increase of 370 informal resolutions, or a 6.9% increase (refer to graphs #3 and #4).


There were 31,426 Inmate Grievance Resolution Committee (IGRC) hearings (69.30% of total filed) held statewide in 2005, an increase from the 30,515 hearings (68.44% of total filed) in 2004. This reflects an increase of 911 IGRC hearings. This increase is consistent with the increase in total grievances filed statewide (refer to graphs #5 and #6).


In 2005, there were 2,796 grievances closed and dismissed by the IGRC in accordance with Directive #4040, Section V. A. 5. This represents 6.2% of all grievances filed. For comparison, in 2004 a total of 2,787 grievances, or 6.3% of all grievances filed, were closed and dismissed by the IGRC.


A total of 25,301 grievances were processed at the Superintendent's level in 2005. This reflects a decrease of 235 grievances, or a 0.9 % decrease, from the 25,536 grievances addressed by the Superintendent in 2004. The 2005 figures indicate 55.8% of all grievances filed were processed at the Superintendent's level (refer to graphs #7 and #8).


The total number of grievances resolved/closed at the facility level was 30,223 or 66.7% of all grievances filed. This reflects an increase of 2,570 grievances from the 29,213 grievances closed at the facility level in 2004. For clarification, the number of grievances closed at the facility level has been computed by subtracting the number of grievances heard at CORC from the total number of grievances filed (refer to graphs #9 and #10).


























As of February 1, 1994, any grievances related to allegations of Directive #4910, Control of & Search for Contraband, violations during a strip search/strip frisk were reported on the Code Classification Sheet in Codes 25.1 for Strip Search and 25.2 for Strip Frisk. The strip search and strip frisk grievances were carried on the clerk's log and supplemental sheets in the same manner as all other grievances. In 2005, the number of grievances under Code 25.1 (13-Strip Search) and 25.2 (34-Strip Frisk) totaled 47. This compares to 58 in 2004, 49 in 2003, 65 in 2002, 82 in 2001, 72 in 2000, 74 in 1999, 74 in 1998, 78 in 1997, 82 in 1996 and 86 in 1995.

Beginning in September 1999, grievances related to Native Americans were to be monitored for two years. These grievances have "Native American" in the title and were reported monthly. Through 2000, there were 54 grievances in reference to Native Americans reported. In 2001, there were 50 grievances in this category. Through July 2002, an additional 21 Native American grievances were reported. Although, still tracked in the same manner with the use of the title, subsequent reports have not been requested since July 2002.

A category regarding the Department's Smoke Free Policy was added to the Code Classification Sheet in 1999 as Code 23.1. There were 41 grievances filed in this category in 2005, as compared to 84 in 2004, 53 in 2003, 64 in 2002, 124 in 2001 and 158 in 2000.

Effective July 2000, any grievances related to allegations of pat frisks of female inmates were reported on the Code Classification Sheet under Code 25.3, Pat Frisk (Female Inmates). In the last six months of 2000, there were 3 grievances filed in this category. This total increased to 7 in 2001, 5 in 2002, 11 in 2003 and 7 in 2004. In 2005, there were 9 grievances reported.

In 2004, any grievances related to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) were filed in a new category as Code 22.1. There were 206 grievances filed in this category that year. In 2005, there were 170 grievances filed under Code 22.1, a decrease of 36 grievances.

III. IGP STAFF

Central Office staff made approximately 37 facility visits during 2005. Inmate Grievance Central Office staff conducted orientation/training sessions for 568 Training Academy Correctional Officer recruits, and 27 Sergeants in the Training Academy Sergeant's School. In addition to regularly scheduled weekly CORC meetings, IGP Central Office staff attended 33 meetings, conferences, ceremonies, training/meetings and various events.

During 2005, 10 facility staff transitions occurred due to reassignment, promotion and resignations. There were 4 Central Office staff transitions due to lateral transfer or promotion. All Inmate Grievance Programs that had staff transitions during 2005 received assistance from the regional program coordinators or other facility staff in order to help maintain the programs until replacement of staff was accomplished.

In 2005, staff transitions occurred at the following facilities:

Albion C.F. - The IGP Supervisor transferred to Gowanda C.F. in December 2005. The item was vacant at the end of the year.

<u>Cayuga C.F.</u> - The IGP Supervisor took a lateral transfer to Central Office in July 2005. An IGP Supervisor was hired to fill the vacancy through a lateral transfer from Five Points C.F. in September 2005.

Coxsackie C.F. - The IGP Supervisor position took a lateral transfer to Central Office in May 2005. The item was filled through the Civil Service list in September 2005.

Elmira C.F. - The IGP Supervisor took a lateral transfer to Watertown C.F. in December 2005. The item was vacant at the end of the year.

<u>Five Points C.F.</u> - The IGP Supervisor took a lateral transfer to Cayuga C.F. in September 2005. The IGP Supervisor position was filled through the Civil Service list in December 2005.

Green Haven C.F. - The IGP Supervisor resigned from the department in March 2005 and the item was filled in August 2005 through the Civil Service list.

Gowanda C.F. - The IGP Supervisor took a position as a Corrections Counselor and the IGP Supervisor from Albion C.F. took a lateral transfer to this facility in December 2005.

Mid-State C.F. - The IGP Supervisor took a position as a Corrections Counselor and the position was filled in November 2005 when the Central Office IGP Supervisor took a lateral transfer to this facility.

Oneida C.F. - The IGP Supervisor took a position as a Correction Counselor in March 5, 2005. The IGP Supervisor position was filled through the Civil Service list in December 2005.

Watertown C.F. - The IGP Supervisor retired in August 2005 and the Elmira IGP Supervisor took a lateral transfer in December 2005.

In 2005, the following staff transitions occurred in Central Office as follows:

April - An IGP Supervisor transferred to Mid-State Correctional Facility
An IGP Coordinator was promoted to Institutional Steward at Hudson Correctional
Facility. A facility IGP Supervisor took a lateral transfer to the vacant IGP Supervisor
position in Central Office.

July - The Cayuga IGP Supervisor was promoted to an IGP Coordinator in Central Office.

November - An IGP Coordinator resigned from the department and accepted a position within another agency.

<u>December</u> - A Keyboard Specialist I was promoted to a Clerk II in Central Office Health Services. A Central Office IGP Supervisor was promoted to an Inmate Grievance Coordinator in Central Office.

During 2005, Central Office staff responded to 3,335 letters from inmates, as well as correspondence from inmates' family and friends, compared to 3,207 in 2004. Central Office staff researched and copied grievance case materials for 57 Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) requests from various persons and agencies, the same as in 2004. Relevant to inmate litigation, Central Office staff researched and gathered grievance documents for 547 inquiries from the Attorney General's staff, up from the 394 in 2004.

IV. Central Office Review Committee (CORC)

The CORC is the final appellate level of the Inmate Grievance Program. The CORC consists of the Deputy Commissioner and Counsel, Deputy Commissioner for Correctional Facilities, Deputy Commissioner for Program Services, Deputy Commissioner for Administrative Services, and the Deputy Commissioner and Chief Medical Officer, or their designees expressly authorized to act for them. The CORC functions on behalf of the Commissioner and under his authority. The CORC decisions have the effect of directives.

The PLRA of 1995, amended 42 U.S.C. Section 1997e(a), requires that immates must exhaust available administrative remedies before litigating over prison conditions. This has been a major factor in the increase in grievance appeals. In addition, there have been two United States Supreme Court decisions that have been a catalyst in this increase. On May 29, 2001, the court decided in *Booth v. Churner* that even if the administrative remedy does not provide monetary damages, it is still an available remedy. Subsequently, on February 26, 2002, the court, in *Porter v. Nussle* decided that exhaustion is required in every situation, regardless of the nature of the inmate's underlying claim.


Grievance appeals to CORC decreased from the 15,374 in 2004 to 15,122 in 2005. This reflects an decrease of 252 grievance appeals. The CORC addressed 9,548 grievance appeals in 1999, 10,527 in 2000, 11,754 in 2001, 12,395 in 2002 and 14,432 in 2003. Since 1999, the CORC has realized an annual increase of 5,574 grievance appeals, a 58.4% increase.

The number of the CORC responses to grievance appeals is affected by 'carry-overs' at the beginning (grievances filed in 2004 but received at the CORC in 2005) and the end (grievances filed in 2005 but answered by the CORC in 2006) of each year. The 15,122 total is the actual number of grievances answered by the CORC in 2005 (refer to graph #11).

Of the 15,122 grievances decided by the CORC in 2005, 5,047 or 33%, were determined to be meritorious or have merit in part. In 2004, 4,409 or 28.7% were found to be meritorious or have merit in part. The number of meritorious grievances in 2005 represents an increase of 638 grievances from that in 2004.

The CORC dispositions were transmitted back to the grievants in an average of 17.8 calendar days. This reflects a decrease from the 22.2 calendar day average in 2004.

The CORC dispositions were transmitted back to the grievants in an average of 57 calendar days from the date filed at the facility. This is a decrease of 11.1 calendar days from the calendar day average of 68.1 in 2004, and well within the 90 calendar day limit mandated by Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations and the Federal Certification.

V. GRIEVANCE TRENDS AND ANALYSIS

The 45,345 grievances filed in 2005 reflect an increase of 758 grievance submissions from the 44,587 grievances filed in 2004. Historically, Code 24, Special Housing Units, had been one of the most grieved areas. From 1993 until 1998, it was not ranked among the five highest categories. Since 1998, the five most grieved categories in order of rank have been Staff Conduct, Medical, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, Package Room and Special Housing Units. The grievances filed from the S-Blocks, Southport C.F. and Upstate C.F. had an impact on each of these categories and are the primary reason the Special Housing Units code remains in the top 5 categories.

However, in 2002, Code 49, Staff Conduct, and Code 22, Medical, reversed positions with Code 22, Medical, becoming the lead category. The trends and analysis in each category continue to be consistent with prior years except for the increase in the number of medical grievances as explained below.

1. CODE 22, MEDICAL

In 2005, the number of medical grievances filed was 8,303 compared to the 8,360 filed in 2004, a decrease of 57 or .68%. Medical grievances accounted for 18.3% of all grievances filed, compared to the 18.08% filed in 2004, a decrease of .22 %.

The grievances can be attributed to the inmates who regularly file numerous medical complaints for real or perceived medical problems, and do so at any facility in which they are housed. Thus, many of the issues presented remain constant in this category. It is believed that some medical grievances are filed in order to create a record of the grievant's request for medical attention or in an attempt to enhance medical treatment. There are grievances filed where the requested action is cited as a health concern, even though the request may be non-medical in nature. There has been no impact on this category by HIPAA, as evidenced by the decrease in Code 22.1 grievances from the 206 grievances in 2004 to the 170 in 2005.

In some cases, prolific grievants are seriously ill and the number of grievances they file often demonstrate anxiety. Many complain of chronic back pain, arthritis, etc. The anxiety results in grievances because of the time taken to accomplish an outside consult or appointment. This analysis is validated by the repetition in the composition of the complaints. Another factor is the perception on the part of inmates that recommendations made by outside consultants must be implemented without question, when in reality the Facility Health Services Directors evaluate the recommendation and determine the treatment plan for inmates under their care.

Further, an immate's expectation of specific treatment plans and desired medical services often does not fall within the realm of possibility, nor are they medically indicated by facility doctors. Requests for specialty consultants such as dermatologists, podiatrists, ophthalmologists, allergists, neurologists and various others are common. Requests for medical procedures which are not in accordance with the medical provider's policy or the Department's Health Services Manual, and are not ordered by the Facility Health Services Director, account for some of the medical complaints.

In some grievances, a medical condition is cited as the reason for requesting items that are issued on medical order only. These requests are for items such as bed boards, orthopedic shoes,

eyeglasses, nutritional supplements, Visine, skin creams, pain medications, medicated shampoos and vitamins. Other examples of special medical requests are single cells, lower bunks, additional showers, special diets, medical appliances and boxer shorts.

In some instances, the medical condition cited by the inmate does not exist according to that inmate's medical record, nor is it a condition already being addressed by the facility health staff. Access to outside health providers is also a factor in the number of medical grievances. The combination of perceived illness and actual illness within the inmate population is expected to continue to account for a portion of the number of medical complaints.

The S-Block, Upstate C.F. and Southport C.F. inmates do not come out of their cells except for visits, disciplinary hearings and if the facility doctor determines it is necessary for a medical examination. These inmates feel they should come out for all medical contacts due to privacy concerns.

An increase in the number of wheelchair inmates brought Americans with Disability Act (ADA) issues such as supplies, higher bed, catheters, outside trips, replacement wheelchairs and aides.

The description of grievances in the medical category is intended to demonstrate the variety of complaints received and is not a complete list of medical grievances.

2. CODE 49, STAFF CONDUCT

In 2005, the number of staff conduct grievances filed was 7,116 compared to the 7,439 filed in 2004, a decrease of 323 grievances or 4.34%. The staff conduct grievances accounted for 15.7% of all grievances filed compared to the 16.07% filed in 2004.

A significant number of staff conduct grievances continues to be attributed to inmate interaction with staff resulting in misbehavior reports. The perception among staff is that some of the harassment complaints resulting from interaction between employees and inmates are filed by the inmates in an attempt to discredit misbehavior reports written by staff and to recover the \$5.00 surcharge imposed on inmates for affirmed misbehavior reports. A January 1992 revision of Title 7, NYCRR authorizes the surcharge.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, has remained in the five most grieved categories due to the wide range of issues that could be perceived and presented by inmates as inappropriate staff conduct or harassment. A review of Code 49 grievance titles substantiates that "Staff Conduct" numbers are inflated by inmate perception, any difference of opinion with staff and an inmate's unfamiliarity with facility policies or statewide rules.

For example, direct orders are commonly seen as a form of harassment as noted in the description of events in grievances submitted in this code. An inmate's failure to follow procedures may result in the loss of an opportunity to participate in an activity or to exercise an option. An example of this is when an inmate neglects to respond to announcements concerning the commencement of certain activities or the preparation of a list by staff of inmates who wish to participate in an upcoming activity. This results in the inmate's inability to participate and consequently, the filing of grievances due to the perception of unfair treatment or that staff could have made an exception. The logistics involved in coordinating the activities and movement of

large groups of people have not traditionally been readily appreciated by an inmate who files this type of complaint, since the result of such consideration would not support strict adherence to rules governing callouts, attendance and movement.

The examples of grievances in the staff conduct category are intended to demonstrate the variety of complaints received and are not a complete list of staff conduct grievances.

3. CODE 23, HOUSING-INTERNAL BLOCK AFFAIRS

In 2005, the number of Housing-Internal Block Affairs grievances filed was 3,206 compared to 3,652 filed in 2004, a decrease of 446 grievances or 12.2%. The grievances in this code accounted for 7.1% of all grievances filed, compared to the 8.20% filed in 2004, a decrease of 1.1%.

Grievances in this code concern physical housing conditions/issues such as double cell, double bunk, cube space, air circulation/fans, furniture, hot water, heat, window screens and storage space.

Service related grievances include cell cleaning supplies, laundering of clothes and linen, winter blankets, list taking procedures, callout procedures, haircuts, in-cell feed up, maintenance of housing areas and repair of housing areas. Other grievances pertain to supplies, enforcement of cell standards, desired/undesired cell moves, honor block denials, denied items or service, cleanliness, pest control measures, removal from double bunk beds, staff performance of duties, distribution of personal mail, mailboxes, razor issue policy, bulletin boards, posting of memos, announcements over public address system, television cable and radio/television volume.

The noted issues in this category are intended to demonstrate the variety of complaints filed in Code 23; it is not a complete list of housing unit complaints.

4. CODE 30, PACKAGE ROOM

In 2005, the number of package room grievances filed was 2,360 compared to 2,027 filed in 2004, an increase of 333 grievances or 16.4%. Package room grievances accounted for 5.2% of all grievances filed, compared to the 4.5% filed in 2004, showing an increase of .7% in this code.

Many of the package room complaints result from a difference in security staff and inmate interpretation of Departmental Directive #4911, entitled "Packages & Articles Sent or Brought to Facilities". The governing directive describes items permitted to be received and the provisions thereof. The package room complaints have not substantially changed. The issues include hot pots, typewriters, watches, sneakers, food items and musical instruments. In August 2005, the Package Room Directive #4911, was revised and streamlined. Facilities reported package room grievances challenging the new policies and procedures of the new directive. However, it is expected that the revision will provide a more clear clarification and interpretation of the items allowed through the package room.

Other issues still focus around an inmate's desire for items not allowed by directive because they are too valuable and present security concerns, and do not conform to size limitations. Other issues include permitted items that do not conform to other requirements of

the package room directive, such as packaging for food products, colors of clothing/ undergarments/linens, the opening of package items to be searched and items that require approval of the Superintendent for receipt via special permit.

As in past years, the technological advancement in the design and variety of some allowable items results in their denial, since the item is essentially changed and does not conform to package room guidelines.

Package Room grievances were also affected by the S-Block and Upstate C.F. inmates as a result of their movement from a maximum security keeplock situation to an S-Block or Upstate C.F. The inmate, although not on a loss of packages disposition, falls under the Special Housing Unit (SHU) policies regarding the limitation of packages as outlined in Directive #4933.

The resulting desire for products unacceptable for receipt via the package room impacts the number of grievances filed in this category.

5. CODE 24, SPECIAL HOUSING UNITS

In 2005, the number of SHU grievances filed was 1,826 compared to 1,511 filed in 2004. This is an increase of 315 grievances or 20.8%. SHU accounted for 4.0% of all grievances filed, compared to 3.4% in 2004, an increase of .6%.

Grievance submissions from the S-Blocks are up 260 from 2004. Upstate C.F. and Southport C.F. combined showed a decrease of 173 grievance submissions from 2004. Some inmates transferred to these units were coming from maximum security facilities where they were in keeplock status in a general population cell. As a condition of confinement, the inmates must follow the SHU policies consistent with Directive #4933, which limits property in the cell, visits, packages, inmate contact, etc. Therefore, they grieve all aspects of the SHU policies.

Many of these aspects include smoking policy, cell cleanup, Progressive Inmate Movement System (PIMS) level issues, food issues and library materials.

The grievances in this category deal with SHU issues and do not reflect the actual number of grievances filed from SHU.

ONEIDA HUB

Camp Georgetown Correctional Facility

There were 6 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 16 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 5 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 13 last year. These grievances alleged verbal harassment.

Camp Pharsalia Correctional Facility

There were 10 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 12 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 5 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 7 last year. These grievances alleged harassment by staff.

Hale Creek Correctional Facility

There were 91 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 26 last year. Inmates are staying at Hale Creek for a longer duration after completing programs, therefore, the total number of grievances filed is increasing.

Code 22, Medical, had 22 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 6 last year. These grievances concerned outside consultations, light duty requests, medications, medical treatment, special diet, and orthotic footwear.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 37 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 16 last year. These grievances alleged verbal harassment by staff.

Marcy Correctional Facility

There were 600 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 444 last year.

Code 20, ASAT, had 19 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 13 last year. These grievances concerned conversion of the Phoenix House CASAT to general population ASAT. Inmates questioned participation credit upon transfer, policies, and staff changes.

Code 22, Medical, had 223 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 168 last year. These grievances concerned requests to see a different physician, outside specialist consults and testing, medical treatment, medication delays, bottom bunk requests and permit issues.

Code 24, Special Housing Units, had 28 grievances in 2004, a decrease from the 42 last year. These grievances concerned installation of night lights and cell moves during refurbishing of the unit.

Code 30, Package Room, had 23 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 16 last year. These grievances concerned shipping costs, reimbursement, and denial of items.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 29 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 17 last year. These grievances concerned religious meals, portion size (S-Block), temperature (S-Block), shortages and substitutions.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 81 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 49 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, harassment, and threats.

Mid-State Correctional Facility

There were 713 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 631 last year.

Code 6, Guidance Unit/Counseling, had 62 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 43 last year. These grievances concerned the Chemical Dependancy/Sex Offender Program, assessment for the program, and challenges to the pull-up component of the program. Other grievances concerned recommended programs and area of preference transfers.

Code 22, Medical, had 195 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 138 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, testing, outside consultations, special permits, boots, medications, and delay in care.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 92 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 43 last year. These grievances concerned housing unit policies, timely mail distribution, cube standards, and housing unit equipment.

Code 30, Package Room, had 17 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 15 last year. These grievances concerned denial of packages and specific items, missing packages, destroyed items, and interpretation of the new Directive #4911.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 70 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 64 last year. These grievances alleged staff incompetence, verbal abuse, threats, and physical abuse.

Mohawk Correctional Facility

There were 624 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 797 last year.

Code 20, ASAT, had 28 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 25 last year. These grievances concerned attempts to enter into ASAT early. One grievance was filed from an RMU inmate wanting an ASAT program while in the medical unit.

Code 22, Medical, had 106 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 104 last year. These grievances alleged staff incompetence and delays in care or concerned requests to see a doctor and/or specialist, medications, bottom bunks, and reasonable accommodations.

Code 30, Package Room, had 21 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 49 last year. These grievances concerned denial of items. The decrease is attributed to increased communication between the Inmate Grievance Program Supervisor, Package Room staff and the inmate population in an attempt to address and resolve package room issues.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 99 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 186 last year. These grievances alleged staff incompetence, poor attitude, verbal abuse, inappropriate language, racial slurs, and physical abuse. There was no trend indicated to explain the decrease. However, it is noted that there was an overall decrease in grievances filed at the facility.

Oneida Correctional Facility

There were 416 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 307 last year.

Code 6, Guidance Unit/Counseling, had 29 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 14 last year. These grievances concerned not wanting recommended programs such as ART, timely Earned Eligibility Certificates, and poor counseling.

Code 22, Medical, had 42 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 46 last year. These grievances concerned medical treatment, testing, permit issues, eyeglasses, and medications.

Code 30, Package Room, had 29 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 23 last year. These grievances concerned disallowed items, headphones, visitor receipts, keyboards. and missing/lost/returned packages and items.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 51 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 75 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, racial remarks, physical abuse, and threats.

Summit Shock Correctional Facility

There were 9 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 12 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 4 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. These grievances concerned hernia surgery, medications, treatment, and medical sneakers.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 3 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 8 last year. These grievances alleged staff harassment, mail tampering and threats of a misbehavior report. All were filed by one inmate.

WATERTOWN HUB

Cape Vincent Correctional Facility

There were 321 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 272 last year.

Code 3, Correspondence, had 47 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 17 last year. These grievances concerned denials of photographs, delays in receiving mail and allegations of lost items. It is noted that there was intermittent coverage in the mail room by staff from other areas who were not experienced in mail room operations.

Code 22, Medical, had 50 grievances in 2005, the same as last year. The grievances concerned quality of care, delays in care, medical policies and procedures, medication issues and requests for specialty care.

Code 30, Package Room, had 23 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 9 last year. These grievances concerned denied items, requests for grace periods, lost and damaged items and challenges to Directive #4911. It is noted that the Package Room hours were decreased from two shifts to one and there was a change over in staff assigned to the area.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 91 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 86 last year. These grievances alleged physical and verbal abuse, threats and staff incompetence.

Gouverneur Correctional Facility

There were 821 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 693 last year.

Code 3, Correspondence, had 14 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 27 last year. These grievances concerned nude photos and allegations of mishandling of mail.

Code 22, Medical, had 121 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 105 last year. These grievances concerned medications, quality of care, delays in care, requests for second opinions and specialty care.

Code 24, Special Housing Units, had 114 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 68 last year. These grievances concerned counts, night lights, feed up procedures, radio system and enforcement of the rules and regulations. The increase in activity in this code may be attributed to new count and night light policies. Continued strict enforcement of the rules and regulations and poor radio station reception have had an impact on this code.

Code 30, Package Room, had 48 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 37 last year. These grievances concerned disallowed items, lost items and challenges to Directive #4911.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 43 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 38 last year. It is noted that 93 % of these grievances concerned the quality and quantity of feed up trays in S-Block. Additional complaints were made by general population inmates regarding adherence to the statewide menu.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 148 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 101 last year. Grievance allegations included verbal harassment, retaliation, threats and staff incompetence.

Ogdensburg Correctional Facility

There were 85 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 145 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 15 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 24 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care and requests for special care.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 25 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 45 last year. These grievances alleged verbal harassment, threats and staff incompetence.

Riverview Correctional Facility

There were 522 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 513 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 87 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 80 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, special requests, medications, policies and procedures and delays in care.

Code 30, Package Room, had 47 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 60 last year. These grievances concerned disallowed items, timeliness of processing, missing items and Package Room procedures.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 66 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 92 last year. These grievances alleged incompetence, verbal abuse, threats, racial slurs and physical abuse.

Watertown Correctional Facility

There were 165 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 197 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 39 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 67 last year. These grievances concerned specialized care, diets, delay in care and requests for outside consults.

Code 30, Package Room, had 11 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 6 last year. These grievances concerned denial of clothing items, lost or damaged items and reimbursement for returned packages.

Code 49, had 36 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 42 last year. The grievances concerned allegations of incompetence, verbal abuse, threats, discrimination, and physical abuse.

CLINTON HUB

Adirondack Correctional Facility

There were 52 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 94 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 11 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 26 last year. These grievances concerned delay in care, quality of care, medical procedures, medication and special requests.

Code 39, Facility Maintenance, had 0 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 5 last year. Last year, the grievances alleged exposure to asbestos.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 9 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 19 last year. These grievances alleged physical abuse, discrimination, threats and verbal abuse.

Altona Correctional Facility

There were 96 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 254 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 9 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 12 last year. These grievances concerned delay in care, medical procedures, medication, special requests, and denial of an outside consultation.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 18 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 15 last year. These grievances alleged staff incompetency, threats, verbal abuse and physical abuse.

Bare Hill Correctional Facility

There were 676 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 588 last year. The increase in grievances is a result of the turnover in the inmate population. Approximately 1,489 inmates transferred into Bare Hill in 2005.

Code 6, Guidance Unit/Counseling, had 42 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 24 last year. These grievances concerned the mandatory enrollment for school, vocational school completion, the recommendations of therapeutic needs, waiting time to see the counselor, and staff not answering inmate letters.

Code 20, ASAT, had 22 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. These grievances concerned inmates disputing their need for ASAT, and the waiting time to enroll in the program. During 2005, the Guidance Unit had over 700 inmates eligible to participate in the program, however, only one dorm was designated for ASAT. In July, another dorm was added, and now the program is accessible in the Main and the Annex.

Code 22, Medical, had 122 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 150 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delay in care, procedures, medication and special requests.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 242 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 151 last year. These grievances alleged threats, staff incompetence, verbal and physical abuse, and racial slurs.

Camp Gabriels Correctional Facility

There were 14 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 36 last year.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 5 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 2 last year. These grievances all concerned the TV room being locked.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 5 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 11 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, threats, and harassment.

Chateaugay Correctional Facility

There were 58 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 44 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 8 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. These concerned x-ray results, improper care, ankle brace, glasses, hay fever and medication.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 26 grievances in 2005, the same as the 26 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, destruction of property, staff turning off the TV, unprofessional staff, staff incompetency, retaliation, deprivations, threats and harassment.

Clinton (Main) Correctional Facility

There were 1,823 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 1,115 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 348 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 243 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delay in care, denied outside consultations, medical procedures, medication issues, special medical requests for footwear and eye care.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 159 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 112 last year. These grievances concerned cell repairs, cable repair, denial of meals, mail, cell inspections, unit temperature, and supplies.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 131 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 109 last year. These grievances alleged threats, physical abuse, racial slurs, verbal abuse, and staff incompetence.

Clinton (Annex) Correctional Facility

There were 255 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 145 last year. The increase in grievances is attributed to the number of reception inmates received from facilities such as Clinton, Attica, Five Points and Elmira. The transition from cell living to dormitories is an adjustment.

Code 22, Medical, had 57 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 26 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delay in care, medication, bottom bunk permits, blood work, nasal spray and dandruff shampoo.

Code 30, Package Room, had 11 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 5 last year. These grievances concerned missing items, denied items and being denied a Sergeant's review.

Code 31, Rules & Regulations, had 11 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 5 last year. These grievances concerned urinalysis testing, items allowed at work sites, meals and showers.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 95 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 51 last year. These grievances alleged physical abuse, racial slurs, threats, verbal abuse, and staff incompetency. It is noted that 42% of the grievances filed in this category were from immates in reception and keeplock status.

Franklin Correctional Facility

There were 492 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 363 last year.

Code 21, Dental, had 55 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 17 last year. These grievances concerned a lengthy waiting list to see the Dentist, as there was a vacancy in the Dental item, requests to see an outside Dentist and call out procedures.

Code 22, Medical, had 81 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 74 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delay in seeing the Doctor and consultations, medical procedures, medication and special requests.

Code 30, Package Room, had 22 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 12 last year. These grievances concerned processing of packages, package given to the wrong inmate, mailing the packages, denial of items and location of packages. The increase in grievances filed may be attributed to the decrease of staff working in the package room. Further, new staff were utilized, but their unfamiliarity with the package room may have slowed processing time.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 120 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 106 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, staff incompetency, threats, sexual harassment, racial slurs and physical abuse.

Lyon Mountain Correctional Facility

There were 31 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 34 last year.

Code 3, Correspondence, had 4 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. These grievances concerned mail being sent out, photos being denied, and mail being returned without consent.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 6 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 15 last year. These grievances alleged physical abuse, threats, verbal abuse and being denied to play basketball.

Upstate Correctional Facility

There were 3,531 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 3,830 last year

Code 22, Medical, had 791 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 858 last year. These grievances concerned medical procedures, quality of care, delay in care, denied outside consultations, medication and special medical requests. There were 42 non-calendared medical contacts in 2005, an increase from the 29 last year. The decrease in grievances filed may be attributed to the increase in non-calendared medical contacts.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 233 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 468 last year. These grievances concerned denial of cell cleanup, headphones, matches, nail clippers, toilet paper, exercise, meals, announcements, time to shave, laundry, cell drain cleaner, scouring powder to scrub shower, cell change, problems with cell mate, night lights, and cell repairs. The decrease is a result of the area supervisor resolving issues before they become a grievance.

Code 40, Law Library, had 198 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 218 filed last year. These grievances concerned denial of materials, delay in receiving materials that are in high demand, denial of access to the Law Library, not receiving the original documents with the copies, assistance with certified mail, notary services, request for supplies, request for a list of available materials, and typing services.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 653 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 687 last year. These grievances alleged physical abuse, racial slurs, threats, verbal abuse, and staff incompetence.

SULLIVAN HUB

Eastern Correctional Facility

There were 895 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 674 last year.

Code 20, ASAT, had 73 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 72 last year. These grievances concerned referrals, evaluations, transfers, and removals.

Code 22, Medical, had 118 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 124 last year. These grievances concerned medical records, medications, eyeglasses, hearing aid issues, boots, medical copies, test results, specialists, and permit requests.

Code 30, Package Room, had 21 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 52 last year. These grievances concerned denial of items and reimbursement for shipping.

Code 42, Inmate Rights, had 38 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 7 last year. These grievances concerned denial of reasonable accommodations, notary, FOIL, directives, and books on tape. Two inmates filed 19 of the grievances in this category.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 235 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 65 last year. These grievances alleged racial slurs, threats, cell searches, job assignments, and most involved a misbehavior report. One inmate filed 170 grievances.

Mid-Orange Correctional Facility

There were 348 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 499 last year.

Code 20, ASAT, had 1 grievance filed in 2005, a decrease from the 10 last year. This grievance concerned an inmate's claim that he didn't need ASAT. Overall, grievances decreased due to currently operating two ASAT dormitories, and the decreased wait time to begin the program.

Code 22, Medical, had 137 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 133 last year. These grievances concerned hearing aids, medical treatment, second opinions, testing, confidentiality, surgery, doctors, HIPAA, medical boots, records, specialists and emergency sick call.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 19 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 28 last year. These grievances concerned occupancy standards, double bunking, ladders, cube policy, seniority moves, showers, and kitchen privileges.

Code 44, Inmate Grievance Program, had 21 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. Sixteen grievances were filed by one inmate. All sixteen pertained to HIPAA, medical confidentiality, as related to inmate grievance procedures.

Otisville Correctional Facility

There were 394 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 253 last year.

Code 3, Correspondence, had 17 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 13 last year. These grievances concerned missing/damaged magazines, postage fees, third party mail, withheld mail, delayed mail, returned money order, and the 5 page printed material limitation.

Code 22, Medical, had 67 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 41 last year. These grievances concerned medical transfer, bus pass, program excuses, tests/x-rays, infirmary housing, outside specialist consultations, orthotic footwear, treatment, and medications.

Code 29, Inmate Property, had 20 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. The increase was credited to inmates arriving from other facilities with items that are not permitted. These grievances concerned permit items on transfer in, damaged/lost items, delay in issue of property from other facilities.

Code 30, Package Room, had 57 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 22 last year. The majority of grievances were filed prior to the revision in Directive #4911 and the increase was credited primarily to inexperienced staff filling in during the absence of the regular officer. These grievances concerned denial of items allegedly received at other facilities, missing items, and handling of packages.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 27 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 20 last year. These grievances alleged threats, verbal abuse, cube searches, pat frisks, work details, enforcement of 15 minute program movement, and issues with the net bags.

Shawangunk Correctional Facility

There were 984 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 700 last year.

Code 3, Correspondence, had 45 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 8 last year. These grievances concerned mail holding, tampering, returning, processing or watching. Twelve grievances were filed by one inmate, and fifteen grievances were filed by inmates in SHU.

Code 22, Medical, had 166 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 121 last year. One inmate filed 72 grievances. His issues concerned medical privacy, sick call, timely prescriptions, medical trips, eyeglasses, and TB policy. Other grievances concerned change of providers, medications, medical care, permits, and prosthetics. The C-2 unit for the handicapped was rehabilitated in 2005 and there was a decrease in grievances from that area.

Code 30, Package Room, had 103 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 64 last year. These grievances concerned opening of items, missing items, returned items, and denials of books, watches, footwear, zippered items, and guitar cases.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 41 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 21 last year. Twenty-three of these grievances were related to the Cold Alternative Diet. Those concerns were non-kosher milk/food, kosher tray opened, items not served or improper substitutions. Other grievances concerned cleanliness of trays/silverware/cups, hair nets, and the posting of menus.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 93 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 98 last year. These grievances alleged threats, intimidation, retaliation, and assault by staff.

Sullivan Correctional Facility

There were 592 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 516 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 94 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 75 last year. These grievances concerned medications, surgery, doctors, second mattresses, MRI, specialist orders being followed, medical treatment and orthopedic footwear.

Code 23, Housing - Internal Block Affairs, had 25 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 29 last year. These grievances concerned block television procedures, showers, block policy, requests to be moved, and inmate organization procedures within blocks.

Code 30, Package Room, had 39 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 30 last year. These grievances concerned postage, leather, sneaker color, typewriter ribbons, rechargeable razors, boots, arts/craft items, polyester clothing, frozen food, tea, and items being damaged.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 70 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 64 last year. These grievances alleged retaliation, threats, verbal abuse, racial slurs, frisking, and discrimination.

Ulster Correctional Facility

There were 50 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 58 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 15 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 28 last year. These grievances alleged threats, verbal abuse, denial of Ramadan, inappropriate frisks, and failure to call for visit. Seven of the grievances in this category involved a misbehavior report.

Wallkill Correctional Facility

There were 484 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 330 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 68 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 85 last year. These grievances concerned proper medical attention, specialist requests, medications, doctors, special permits, medical tests, and orthopedic footwear. The decrease is credited to quality improvement meetings, which assist in problem resolution.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 25 grievances in 2005, the same as last year. These grievances concerned housing moves, single cubes, bottom bunks, and double bunks.

Code 30, Package Room, had 31 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 18 last year. These grievances concerned package tampering, raisin bread, granola, eyeglasses, nylon clothing, keyboards, referral to media review, boots, timely mail out, processing of packages and denials of various items.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 102 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 32 last year. These grievances alleged threats, improper cell frisk, physical contact, profanity, retaliation, unprofessional conduct and harassment. The increase in grievances is attributed to an increase in disciplinary hearings and cell searches.

Woodbourne Correctional Facility

There were 298 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 622 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 101 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 146 last year. These grievances concerned medical care, outside appointments and follow-up treatment.

Code 30, Package Room, had 16 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 38 last year. These grievances concerned zippered sweatshirt, fans, multicolored boots, perishable food items, keyboards, invoices, insurance, and package processing.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 18 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 48 last year. These grievances alleged inappropriate actions by staff and were in direct relation to the issuance of a misbehavior report.

GREEN HAVEN HUB

Beacon Correctional Facility

There were 73 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 42 last year.

Code 20, ASAT, had 6 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 2 last year. Grievance issues included challenging the need for the program, requesting entry into the program, and disputing removal from the program.

Code 22, Medical, had 18 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 8 last year. Grievance issues included course of treatment, sick call, medication, wanting to see the Doctor, and access to specialists.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 16 grievances in 2005, an increase from 9 last year. Grievances alleged staff speaking loudly through the night, not following facility policy, not following department policy, not getting inmates to callouts, disputes regarding mandatory clean up in housing units, and security rounds. It was noted that many issues were resolved with supervisory staff intervention.

Bedford Hills Correctional Facility

There were 438 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 491 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 63 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 57 last year. Grievance issues concerned course of treatment, follow up appointments, and medication.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 19 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 37 last year. These grievances alleged rounds were not being made by security staff and concerned general housing unit rules, call out procedures, supplies, cell clean up, and count procedures.

Code 30, Package Room, had 21 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 25 last year. Grievance issues included denial of clothing, footwear, food, shipping charges, and processing times.

Code 31, Rules and Regulations, had 50 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 31 last year. Grievances concerned complaints of security staff not following standard operating procedures, the ten minute movement, sign in/out sheets, pre-hearing confinement, securing of cells subsequent to morning movement, and keeplock showers.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 136 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 184 last year. Grievance allegations included threats, improper use of force, and inappropriate physical contact.

Downstate Correctional Facility (Reception)

There were 369 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 280 last year.

Code 22, Guidance Unit/Counseling had 37 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 24 last year. Grievance issues included continuation of previously provided treatment, deferring non-emergency treatment until transfer, restrictions on medical permits (canes and footwear), and delays in receiving treatment from outside providers.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 34 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 23 last year. The grievances concerned shortages of block supplies, housing unit temperatures, and late recreation because inmates failed to properly clean the blocks.

Code 24, Special Housing, had 9 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. These grievances were filed by one inmate and concerned lack of supplies, 30 day property exchange, feed up procedures, cell clean up, showers, and delivery of mail.

Code 43, Mandatory Surcharges, had 19 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 5 last year. Twelve inmates challenged the encumbrance of DNA fees from prior incarcerations. There were 5 grievances regarding the encumbrance of 100 % of funds for multiple surcharges.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 51 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 34 last year. Grievances alleged verbal harassment, incompetence, assault, and racial discrimination

Downstate Correctional Facility (Cadre)

There were 117 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 128 last year.

Code 2, Incentive Wage Allowance, had 3 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 8 last year. The grievance issues concerned disputes of hourly wage and recognition of certificates for higher paying positions.

Code 30, Package Room, had 30 grievances in 2005, an increase from 14 last year. The increase in grievances is being attributed to staff being unfamiliar with package room policy. Issues included denial of hot pots, sneakers, boots, missing items, overcharging for postage, requests for a supervisor's review, and requirement for Form #2706, Disbursement, and Form #2068, Disposal of Inmate Property, to be completed before a supervisory review of the item will occur.

Fishkill Correctional Facility

There were 1,448 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 1,127 last year.

Code 16, Religion, had 29 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 6 last year, (S-Block inmates filed 7). Grievance issues included Ramadan meals, Kosher diets, NOI services, treatment of religious articles, longer turbans, religious guidelines, and requests for religious articles. One inmate filed 12 grievances regarding the Sikh religion.

Code 22, Medical, had 241 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 228 last year. Grievance issues included medication, course of treatment, Managed Care (podiatry, MRI, ENT, Cat Scans, Physical Therapy), change of provider and apparatuses (footwear, back brace, eyeglasses, wheel chair). Other issues included allegations of ignored sick call requests, delay in care, confidentiality violations, and various RMU issues.

Code 24, Special Housing, had 145 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 70 last year. S-Block inmates filed 118 of these grievances. Issues included state issue, flat work, laundry, rules and regulations, mess hall, general library, and correspondence. One inmate filed 26 grievances.

Code 30, Package Room, had 110 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 52 last year. Grievance issues included disallowed footwear, processing of packages, lost or stolen packages, postage, and packages returned to sender. This category experienced an increase in grievances prior to the revision of Directive #4040 in August, 2005.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 186 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 165 last year (53 from S-block inmates). Grievances included allegations of threats, sexual discrimination, racial slurs, destruction of property, inappropriate comments, ignored medical condition, and retaliation by staff.

Green Haven Correctional Facility

There were 2,925 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 2,397 last year.

Code 3, Correspondence, had 132 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 56 last year. The grievance issues regarded the untimely processing of mail, missing mail and magazines, opening of outgoing mail, and status of certified return receipts. The increase is attributed to staffing issues which resulted in a back log of correspondence. Staff were assigned to relieve this backlog.

Code 22, Medical, had 421 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 294 last year. The increase is being attributed to changes in sick call procedures, and less informal resolution. Grievance issues included change of provider, medication refill policy, access to specialists, Milburn Consent Decree, and course of treatment. The facility has changed its medication refill procedure and delivery of in cell items to reduce the complaints associated with medication refills.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 226 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 147 last year. Grievance issues included double-celling, block Policy & Procedure, access to showers, and call out procedures.

Code 30, Package Room, had 322 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 252 last year. Grievance issues included denial of sneakers, boots, radios, clothing (due to colors, logos, and materials), missing packages, untimely processing, shipping charges, art supplies, keyboards, destruction of property, opening of items, and completion of disposal forms. The new Directive #4911 may have had some impact on the grievances filed in this category, with a slight increase noted after the directive was issued. In addition, it is noted that the facility has redesigned the

package room processing area and obtained additional staff to improve processing times for incoming and outgoing packages.

Code 34, State Issue, had 99 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 36 last year. This increase was attributed to staff vacancy in the state shop. Areas of concern primarily regarded being placed on a call out and receiving state issue. Other complaints were replacement of worn items, wanting new items (not serviceable condition), improper sizing, replacement of state boots. The vacancy has since been filled, however, the staff member was out on extended leave at the end of the year.

Code 36, Inmate Accounts, had 142 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 77 last year. The increase is attributed to timeliness of processing disbursements and money orders which was caused in part by the back log of correspondence. Grievance issues included missing disbursements, mail receipts, interest payments, and disputes of encumbrances.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 289 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 230 last year. Grievance allegations included unprofessional conduct, retaliation, assault, food tampering, destruction of property during cell searches and inappropriate pat frisks.

Taconic Correctional Facility

There were 72 grievances filed in 2005, the same as last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 6 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 16 last year. Grievance issues included course of treatment issues, including medication, surgery, an allegation of mistreatment, and sick call.

Code 31, Rules and Regulations, had 8 grievances in 2005 an increase from the 1 last year. Grievance issues included staff not following the standard operating procedures, directives, and memorandums.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 29 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 22 last year. The majority of these complaints is being attributed to the turnover of facility staff. Grievances alleged verbal harassment, racial discrimination, physical assault, and sexual harassment.

GREAT MEADOW HUB

Coxsackie Correctional Facility

There were 883 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 699 last year.

Code 16, Religion, had 7 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 17 last year. The decrease was attributed to better planning and scheduling of the religious events and programs, and staff being made more aware of religious events/programs that are available to the inmate population. Grievances concerned N.O.I. call outs, wanting to attend services on time, and wanting to attend Protestant services.

Code 22, Medical, had 103 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 79 last year. Grievance issues included sick call procedures, access to providers, specialty care requests, wheel chair request, hearing aid request, medication, and course of treatment.

Code 37, Mess hall, had 39 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 28 last year. The grievances concerned food portions, missing food items, kosher meals, and receiving bread at meals.

Code 40, Law Library, had 16 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 27 last year. The decrease is being attributed to staff resolving law library issues informally. Grievance issues included access to call outs, denial of service, and request for service while keep locked, and law library policies.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 273 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 204 last year. Two inmates filed 52 grievances. Grievance allegations included racial remarks, inappropriate language, threats, denial of property and privileges and allegations of assault.

Great Meadow Correctional Facility

There were 2,364 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 2,130 last year.

Code 20, ASAT, had 51 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 5 last year. The increase was attributed to there not being enough room in the program to accommodate all the inmates who requested it. These grievances concerned removal from ASAT, requests for ASAT, and disputes for the need for ASAT.

Code 22, Medical, had 444 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 509 last year. The grievances in this category regarded alleged delays in seeing facility medical staff, access to outside specialists, medication requests, special permits, sick call, and course of treatment.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 219 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 168 last year. The increase in this category is attributed to the facility administration reviewing grievances more closely in accordance with Directive #4040 that were previously coded as staff harassment. Other grievances included delivery of mail, supplies, callouts, block temperatures, and cell clean up.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 192 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 267 last year. These grievances alleged physical abuse, threats, verbal abuse, and staff incompetence. The decrease is attributed to grievances that were previously coded as staff harassment being reviewed more closely in accordance with Directive #4040.

Greene Correctional Facility

There were 253 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 210 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 46 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 32 last year. Grievance issues included medication procedures, medication issues, delay in care, quality of care, and special medical requests.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 111 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 108 last year. Grievance allegations included threats, physical abuse, assault, unprofessional conduct, racial slurs, and verbal abuse.

Hudson Correctional Facility

There were 45 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 60 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 34 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 48 last year. Grievance allegations included unprofessional conduct, racial slurs, verbal abuse and threats.

Moriah Shock Incarceration Facility

There were 0 grievances in 2005, the same as last year.

Mt. McGregor Correctional Facility (Medium)

There were 64 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 137 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 14 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 35 last year. These grievances concerned prescriptions, special permits, and treatment for psoriasis. The decrease is attributed to inmates addressing their complaints directly to medical staff rather than through the IGRC.

Code 30, Package Room, had 8 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. Grievances concerned denial of boots, sneakers and electronic items, and missing items.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 12 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 30 last year. The grievances concerned allegations of verbal harassment, racial discrimination, and assault.

Mt. McGregor (Minimum) Correctional Facility

There was 1 grievance filed in 2005, a decrease from the 5 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 1 grievance in 2005, a decrease from the 3 last year. This grievance regarded an allegation of verbal harassment.

Washington Correctional Facility

There were 99 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 111 last year.

Code 7, Recreation, had 5 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. The grievances regarded insufficient yard time and access to the weight court.

Code 22, Medical, had 9 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 20 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delay in care, medical procedures, special medical requests.

Code 30, Package Room, had 4 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. Grievance issues included the procedures for a Sergeant's review, denial of sneakers and boots.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 34 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 23 last year. These grievances alleged racial slurs, physical abuse, verbal abuse, threats, and staff incompetence.

ELMIRA HUB

Auburn Correctional Facility

There were 2,364 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 2,700 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 355 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 474 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delays in receiving care, and medication. This decrease is due in part to improved staff-to-inmate communication and prompt responses to inmate letters by the Nurse Administrator.

Code 30, Package Room, had 109 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 60 last year. These grievances concerned disallowed items, disposal of disallowed items, and items missing from packages. There was a change in staffing in the Package Room resulting in inconsistent enforcement of Directive #4911.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 590 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from 784 last year. These grievances alleged verbal, physical, and sexual abuse, as well as being denied privileges. This decrease appears directly related to the transfer of one inmate who accounted for 126 of the grievances filed in 2004.

Butler (Minimum) Correctional Facility

There were 35 grievance filed in 2005, a decrease from the 39 last year. It is also noted that 21 of these grievances were informally resolved prior to IGRC hearing.

Code 22, Medical, had 6 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 13 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 12 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, physical assault, and unprofessional behavior by staff.

Butler (ASACTC) Correctional Facility

There were 45 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 21 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 11 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 9 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, physical assault, and unprofessional behavior by staff.

Cayuga Correctional Facility

There were 345 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from 682 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 70 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 143 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delays in care, medication issues, and special footwear. This decrease was due to successful efforts by medical staff to discuss medical complaints with inmates prior to them filing grievances.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 14 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 63 last year. These grievances concerned cleaning procedures, access to personal hygiene items, mattress replacement, use of "wet floor" signs, in cell storage areas, and showers.

Code 30, Package Room, had 29 grievances filed in 2005, the same as last year. These grievances concerned disallowed items and timely delivery of packages.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 12 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 42 last year. These grievances concerned the Cold Alternative Diet, temperature of food, and portion sizes.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 46 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 73 last year. These grievances alleged verbal and physical abuse by staff.

Elmira Correctional Facility

There were 1,913 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 1,841 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 352 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 387 last year. These grievances concerned specialist appointments, prescription medication, access to sick call, delays in receiving care, inadequate care, medical permits, and the need for special footwear.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 220 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 145 last year. These grievances concerned denial of recreation, missing personal property, mail delivery, in cell property, cell furnishings, double celling, denial of meals, and access to call outs. This increase is due in part to new staff assigned to housing units and the resulting changes in implementation of facility policies and procedures.

Code 30, Package Room, had 84 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 81 last year. These grievances concerned missing items, disallowed items, and disposal of items.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 19 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 14 last year. These grievances concerned the Cold Alternative Diet, cleanliness of the kitchen, food temperature, and preparation of meals.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 241 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 205 last year. These grievances alleged verbal harassment, physical assault, filing false misbehavior reports, retaliation for filing grievances, and unprofessional behavior by staff. One inmate accounted for 130 of these grievances.

Five Points Correctional Facility

There were 2,181 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 2,417 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 341 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 302 last year. These grievances concerned improper care, medication issues, not being seen during sick call, and specialist consultations.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 237 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 112 last year. These grievances concerned access to call outs, denial of recreation,

distribution of supplies, double celling, availability of cleaning supplies, and delivery of mail.

This increase is due in part to a large turnover in staff, and efforts by the newly assigned staff to enforce Department and facility policies and procedures.

Code 30, Package Room, had 119 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 124 last year. These grievances concerned delays in receiving packages and disallowed items.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 267 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 374 last year. These grievances alleged threats, verbal abuse, and assault by staff.

Monterey Shock Correctional Facility

There were 0 grievances filed in 2005, the same as last year.

Southport Correctional Facility

There were 3,611 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 3,485 last year

Code 3, Correspondence, had 299 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 303 last year. These grievances concerned the five page limit on printed material, magazine delivery, returning mail, use of disbursements for postage, and being overcharged for postage.

Code 22, Medical, had 894 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 865 last year. These grievances concerned sick call procedures, the need to see a doctor, medication issues, and outside specialist consultations.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 509 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 578 last year. These grievances concerned deprivation orders, the condition of cell furnishings, cell searches, personal property being taken, access to cleaning supplies, and wanting to move to another gallery.

Code 30, Package Room, had 47 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 65 last year. These grievances concerned the denial of used books and periodicals, the amount of snuff allowed, damaged items, disallowed legal folders, the five day grace period, and the timely processing of packages.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 295 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 262 filed last year. These grievances alleged verbal harassment, physical abuse, lying on misbehavior reports, denial of exercise, showers, and supplies, retaliation for filing grievances, and unprofessional behavior by staff.

Willard Drug Treatment Campus

There were 5 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 12 last year.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 3 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 7 last year. These grievances alleged medical neglect and verbal abuse by staff.

NEW YORK CITY HUB

Arthur Kill Correctional Facility

There were 1,053 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 1,051 last year.

Code 2, Incentive Wage Allowance, had 24 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 41 last year. These grievances concerned inmates not being paid, and the delay in back pay.

Code 18, Media Review, had 11 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 4 last year. These grievances concerned not receiving a review notice, books not returned timely and legal mail being sent to the Media Review.

Code 22, Medical, had 253 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 141 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, treatment, requests to see a specialist, medication, sick call, permits, and medical boots. The increase may be attributed to staffing issues, as the pharmacist item was vacant most of the year, and nurses and doctors were from temporary agencies and were not familiar with DOCS policy and procedure.

Code 30, Package Room, had 77 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 58 last year. These grievances concerned denial of a sergeant's review, items being denied, items missing and mailing items. It is noted that this category reflected an increase in grievances prior to the revision of Directive 4911 in August, 2005. The increase in grievances is attributed to the facility developing a "pre-screening" area for officers to review visitor's packages and immediately return denied items to the visitors. The inmates were not afforded a sergeant's review of the denied items, as they did not enter the package room. Subsequently, the "pre-screening area" policy was terminated.

Code 35, Commissary, had 8 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 34 last year. These grievances concerned a request to lower prices, sell bread, refund the commissary buy, restock Sensodyne toothpaste, raise buy limit to include photo tickets, service dialysis patients first at commissary, and raise the buy limit.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 133 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 144 last year. These grievances alleged verbal abuse, staff incompetency, physical abuse, threats, staff eating state food, and dorm moves.

Bayview Correctional Facility

There were 74 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 79 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 16 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 15 last year. These grievances concerned renewal of prescriptions, requests to see a Doctor, and requests for outside treatment.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 4 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 3 last year. These grievances concerned the lack of warning sign on a broken window, and 3 of these grievances concerned a new officer being too strict and enforcing all the rules and regulations.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 30 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 28 last year.

These grievances alleged verbal abuse, disrespectful staff, unprofessionalism, and sexual abuse.

Edgecombe Correctional Facility

There were 0 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 2 last year.

Fulton Correctional Facility

There were 2 grievances filed in 2005, the same as last year.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 2 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. These grievances concerned portion sizes and being denied seconds.

Lincoln Correctional Facility

There was 1 grievance filed in 2005, the same as last year.

Code 31, Rules and Regulations, had 1 grievance in 2005, an increase from the 0 last year. This grievance concerned security staff enforcing local policy and procedure by having the grievant purchase a lock and laundry bag.

Queensboro Correctional Facility

There were 13 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 42 last year.

Code 22, Medical had 1 grievance in 2005, a decrease from the 3 last year. This grievance concerned medication.

Code 30, Package Room, had 1 grievance in 2005, a decrease from the 5 last year. This grievance concerned a missing package.

Code 48, Inmate Liaison Committee, had 0 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 12 last year. The decrease may be attributed to inmates having shorter periods of stay in Oueensboro and increased access and communication with the ILC.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 1 grievance in 2005, a decrease from the 8 last year. This grievance alleged threats.

Sing Sing Correctional Facility

There were 1,275 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 1,560 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 205 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 231 last year. These grievances concerned delay in care, requests for eyeglasses, outside specialists, surgery, medication and requests for additional testing, such as a MRI, cat scan, X-rays, and lab work.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 51 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 40 last year. These grievances concerned block showers, double-bunking, cell movement, privacy curtains, razor exchange and ice distribution.

Code 30, Package Room, had 72 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 84 last year. These grievances concerned missing items, missing packages and denial of items.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 252 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 341 last year. These grievances alleged threats, physical assault, verbal abuse, and intimidation.

WENDE HUB

Albion Correctional Facility

There were 255 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 286 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 26 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 43 last year. The decrease is credited to increased efforts by staff to improve the quality of care. These grievances concerned inadequate care, medications, requests for specialty care and facility doctor appointments.

Code 24, Special Housing Units, had 27 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 42 last year. These grievances concerned the provision of services and supplies.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 144 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 116 last year. These grievances alleged verbal harassment, profanity, voyeurism, the use of physical force and threats.

Attica Correctional Facility

There were 1,805 grievances filed 2005, a decrease from the 1,860 last year.

Code 2, Incentive Wage, had 19 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 30 last year. These grievances concerned pay grade raises, back pay and compensation for additional work.

Code 22, Medical, had 222 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 236 last year. Grievances in this code have decreased for the third straight year in a row. The facility is still attempting to recruit a Facility Health Services Director. These grievances concern medications, the length of time it takes to see outside specialists, requests for facility doctor appointments, discrimination, requests for diagnostic testing, questions regarding the doctors determinations, and allegations of mistreatment by medical staff.

Code 24, Special Housing Unit, had 88 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 106 last year. General maintenance such as heaters, paint and new windows partially account for the decline in this code. These grievances concerned the provision of services, supplies, showers and exercise.

Code 30, Package Room, had 65 grievances in 2005, the same as last year. The changes to Directive #4911 have not appeared to make an impact upon this code. These grievances concerned the receipt of packages, disallowed items, lost items and disposal of property.

Code 35, Commissary, had 71 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 23 last year. These grievances concern out of stock items, overcharges, charged for items not received and payroll not posted to inmate accounts in time for commissary purchases.

Code 36, Inmate Accounts, had 82 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 58 last year. These grievances concerned encumbrances on inmate accounts, processing issues and policies and procedures of the business office. Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 192 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 237 last year. These grievances concerned allegations of physical assault, verbal abuse, sexual harassment, discrimination and threats.

Buffalo Correctional Facility

There were 2 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 1 last year.

Collins Correctional Facility

There were 853 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 827 last year.

Code 18, Media Review, had 4 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 28 last year. These grievances concerned the processing of magazines and were all filed from the S-Block.

Code 22, Medical, had 229 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 148 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care, delay in care, medical procedures, medication, outside consult requests and HIPAA.

Code 27, Tier I & II Policy and Procedure, had 30 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 13 last year. The majority of these grievances were from the S-Block and challenged the hearing process.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 46 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 66 last year. These grievances alleged threats, verbal abuse, physical contact, and improper staff behavior.

Gowanda Correctional Facility

There were 956 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 1,271 last year.

Code 6, Guidance Unit/Counseling, had 65 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 46 last year. The increase reflects changes in coding in that Sex Offender Program grievances were coded in this category instead of a Code 50, Miscellaneous, as in 2004. It is noted that the facility has indicated an overall decrease in sex offender related grievances as the SOP program operated continuously this year without the interruptions and suspension of the program, as in 2004. These grievances concerned program evaluations, the identification of program needs based on counselor's assessments, and program removals.

Code 21, Dental, had 7 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 23 last year. These grievances concerned quality of care and delays in care. It is noted by the facility that the decrease in this code is a result of hiring a second Dentist, decreasing those grievances alleging delays in care.

Code 22, Medical, had 60 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 108 last year. This decrease appears to be as a result of the return of the Nurse Practitioner who was out on extended leave and the reopening of the pharmacy with new staff. These grievances concerned medications, quality of care and requests for specialist consultations

Code 27, Tier I & II Policy and Procedure, had 42 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 61 last year. This is unexpected as the total number of Tier II misbehavior reports increased by approximately 200 from last year. These grievances concerned hearing procedures, biased proceedings and appeals.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 214 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 270 last year The grievances alleged threats, verbal abuse, discriminatory remarks/treatment, retaliation, unprofessional searches and physical abuse.

Groveland Correctional Facility

There were 267 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from 297 last year.

Code 30, Package Room, had 13 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 9 last year. These grievances concerned disallowed and missing items.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 80 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 108 last year. These grievances concerned allegations of verbal harassment, physical assault, threats, discrimination and sexual harassment.

Lakeview Shock Incarceration Facility

There were 837 grievances filed in 2005, an increase from the 750 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 138 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 117 last year. These grievances concerned requests to see specialists, delays in care, medications, medical permits and sick call requests.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 139 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 48 last year. The facility IGP Supervisor has stated that grievances regarding the 30 day bin exchanges and showers have increased without cause. It is noted that the 2004 Annual Report does not identify showers and bin exchanges as frequently grieved topics. Additionally, it is noted that the codes for General Library, Inmate Property, State Issue Items, and Laundry have collectively decreased in 2005. This decrease accounts for 62 grievances that may have otherwise been coded in this category.

Livingston Correctional Facility

There were 386 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 454 filed last year.

Code 24, Special Housing Units, had 1 grievance in 2005, a decrease from the 10 last year. This grievance concerned the announcement of rounds. The decrease is attributed to changes in coding interpretation and classification by the new IGP Supervisor. Grievances that may have been coded Special Housing Unit previously were more accurately coded as Correspondence, Recreation, Mess hall, Commissary and Inmate Accounts.

Code 30, Package Room, had 12 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 23 last year. The decrease in this code can best be attributed to a willingness of Package Room staff to seek advice concerning questionable items in light of the revision to Directive #4911. These

grievances concerned allegations of missing items, Package Room operations and improperly disallowed items by staff.

Orleans Correctional Facility

There were 500 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 542 filed last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 65 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 100 last year. These grievances concerned medication issues, delays in care and specialists consultations.

Code 23, Housing-Internal Block Affairs, had 39 grievances in 2005, an increase from the 23 last year. The majority of these grievances concerned the reconstruction of the dorm showers and bathrooms which seems to account for the increase in activity for this code. The repairs took approximately 2 to 3 weeks per dorm. Other grievances concerned unit policy and procedures, the honor dorm and closed recreation areas.

Code 30, Package Room, had 32 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 37 last year. These grievances concerned delays in processing packages, disallowed item, policy regarding the receipt of packages after visits, and allegations of lost packages. The revision of Directive #4911 does not appear to have affected the number of grievances.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 88 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 100 last year. These grievances concerned alleged verbal harassment and threats, sexual harassment, discrimination, assaults, racial discrimination and incompetence.

Rochester Correctional Facility

There were 2 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 4 last year.

Wende Correctional Facility

There were 1,579 grievances filed in 2005, a decrease from the 1,962 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 329 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 361 last year. These grievances concerned challenges to medical care, treatment, medication prescriptions, special diet requests, delays in treatment, medical permits and specialist consultations.

Code 23, Housing - Internal Block Affairs, had 118 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 250 last year. These grievances concerned recreation, showers, meals, call outs, phone calls and hair cuts. The decrease may be attributed to the informal resolution of such issues by unit staff.

Code 30, Package Room, had 65 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 99 last year. These grievances concerned challenges to the recent revision of Directive #4911, the applicability of prior CORC decisions, disallowed items, lost or damaged items and interpretations of the revised directive by staff.

Code 37, Mess Hall, had 48 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 82 last year. These grievances concerned food temperatures, quality, quantity, diets and feed up trays.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 241 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 294 last year. These grievances concerned allegations of harassment, assault, threats, verbal abuse, discrimination and retaliation.

Wyoming Correctional Facility

There were 379 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 443 last year.

Code 22, Medical, had 72 grievances in 2005, a decrease from the 86 last year. These grievances concerned requests for prompt treatment, treatment from outside specialists, medication and medical permits.

Code 49, Staff Conduct, had 85 grievances in 2005, the same as last year. Grievances concerned allegations of verbal harassment, threats, profanity and misconduct.
